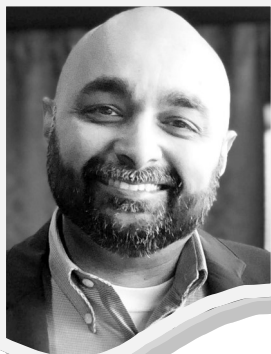
## USS Ralph Johnson (DDG 114) Returns from Maiden Deployment

NAVAL STATION EVERETT, WA (14 January 2021) - Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Ralph Johnson (DDG 114) returned to its home port of Naval Station Everett, WA, following its first deployment to the U.S. 5th and 7th Fleet areas of operation. Ralph Johnson departed Naval Station Everett 15 April 2020, following a restriction-of-movement period. This period was the first of many measures that the ship took to mitigate the risk of crewmembers being exposed to COVID-19 during their deployment. *"The crew's performance was amazing from start to finish,"* said CDR Rob Biggs, Ralph Johnson's commanding officer. *"They excelled in every operation and in all mission tasking. Through all of it they remained focused and united and continued to be committed to making each other better."* Ralph Johnson conducted freedom of navigation operations, sailed with the Indian Navy in combined interoperability exercises, and supported maritime security operations with the International Maritime Security Construct's CTF-Sentinel for 48 days. The ship also provided ballistic missile and air defense while operating with USS Nimitz (CVN 68) and participated in Operation Inherent Resolve. While supporting the Combined Maritime Forces' Combined Task Force (CTF) 150, Ralph Johnson apprehended more than 2,000 lbs. of suspected narcotics from a vessel in Arabian Sea international waters. The ship visited several ports, where sailors were restricted to the pier to mitigate risk of contracting COVID-19. Areas for rest and relaxation were provided to the crew by Navy Moral, Welfare and Recreation programs. During her maiden deployment, Ralph Johnson steamed for a total of 78,186 miles. 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**USCG Cutter Polar Star (WAGB 10)  
Reaches Record-Breaking  
Winter Arctic Latitude**

CHUKCHI SEA — The crew of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Polar Star (WAGB 10), the nation's sole heavy icebreaker, traversed a historic winter latitude on 25 December during a months-long Arctic deployment to protect the nation's maritime sovereignty and security throughout the remote polar region. Polar Star's crew navigated beyond 72 degrees latitude shortly before noon on Christmas before changing course and heading south to continue their Arctic deployment. *"The crew achieved a notable milestone Christmas Day by traversing farther into the harsh, dark winter Arctic environment than any cutter crew in our service's history,"* said CAPT Bill Woitrya, the cutter's commanding officer. *"Our ice pilots expertly navigated the Polar Star through sea ice up to four-feet thick and, in doing so, serve as pioneers to the country's future of Arctic explorations."* With frigid Arctic winds and air temperatures regularly well below zero, Polar Star's engineers work around-the-clock to keep frozen machinery equipment running and the ship's interior spaces warm enough for the crew. The 44-year-old icebreaker is underway to project power and support national security objectives throughout Alaskan waters and into the Arctic, including along the Maritime Boundary Line between the United States and Russia. The Polar Star crew is also working to detect and deter illegal fishing by foreign vessels in the U.S. Exclusive Economic Zone and conduct Arctic training essential for developing future icebreaker operators. Polar Star's record-breaking winter Arctic latitude is 72° 11' N.

blends in partnership with nearby Patterson Cellars. In retirement, Bob enjoyed traveling with Lois and taking his dream boat, "The Big Toy," out on San Francisco Bay; participating in Corvette Club driving tours; leading a subma-

Stiles (above). Bob was born on 22 July 1936 in Dayton, OH to Robert and Fay Renner. In his early years, he was in his element learning about auto and boat mechanics, and loved working alongside Pop Benoit, his grandfather and mentor. At the young age of 16, Bob accomplished no small feat; he built a boat to take out on the Ohio River. It was a project that would lay the foundation for many others to come. As a young man, Bob attended the University of Dayton, and during his senior year met Lois Thesing, who became his wife in February 1961. They were married for 57 years until Lois passed away in May 2018. They had three children, Barbara, Susan and David. Throughout his career as a financial executive, Bob thrived as a change agent while working with struggling companies. Together, Bob and Lois followed Bob's career opportunities and moved their family to places where everyone could grow and thrive. From Ohio to Indiana, to Illinois and Pennsylvania, and finally to California, he was an unwavering provider for his family with a very strong work ethic. Bob was always keen to live near a body of water, and upon mov-

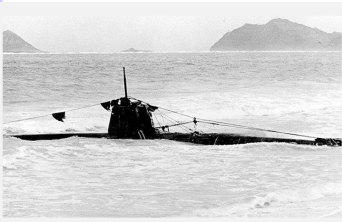
## 10 Facts About the Attack on Pearl Harbor You May Not Know

December 7th, 2020 marks the 79th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, which thrust America into the Second World War. Take a look at 10 interesting details you may not know about the morning of December 7th, 1941:

### 1. Americans fired the first shot.

At 0637 on the morning of December 7th, 1941, the Wickes-class destroyer USS Ward attacked and sank a Ko-hyoteki-class midget submarine near the entrance to the harbor, officially making it not only the first shot fired on that day, but the first American shots in the War in the Pacific. The sub's periscope was spotted above the water by the minesweeper Condor, which alerted the crew of the Ward, who opened fire on the intruder.



### 2. The whole attack took only two hours.

Ultimately, 2,403 Americans died in the attack and 1,178 were wounded. A total of 18 ships were lost or damaged, including the USS Arizona, which still leaks oil from beneath the war memorial in the harbor. All this damage was inflicted in just two short hours.

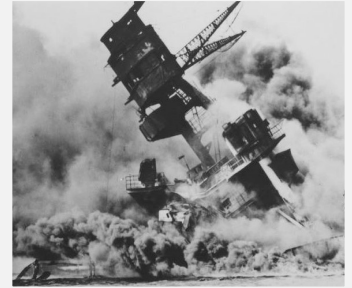

### Aboard the USS Arizona alone, 23 sets of brothers perished.

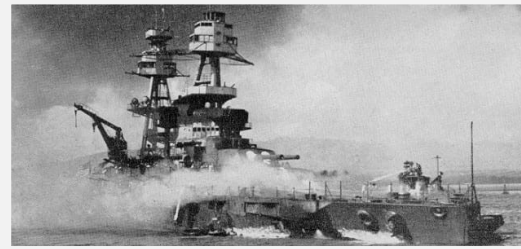
37 pairs or trios of brothers were assigned to the USS Arizona. Of those, 23 sets were killed, constituting 62 men. As a result, the US Navy actually

attempted to discourage the practice of family members serving aboard the same vessels, but no official regulations were ever put in place.



### 4. The USS Nevada tried to make a run for it.

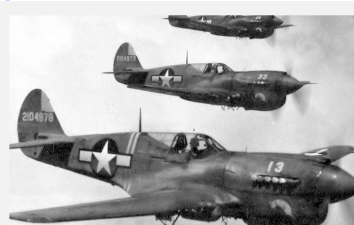
Already unmoored before the attack began, the Nevada left its berth in Battleship Row and tried to make it to the harbor entrance, fighting the entire time. After being repeatedly attacked on its way—she was hit by multiple bombs and torpedoes—the Nevada beached itself on Hospital



Point (see above). Before striking the shore, gunners aboard the Nevada managed to shoot down three planes, including the Nakajima B5N that damaged her with the first torpedo.

### 5. Five Americans managed to get airborne.

A total of five Army Air Corps pilots managed to take flight and go after Japanese planes. No one knows for certain how many planes those pilots shot down, but pilots Ken Taylor and George Welch were credited with at least seven of the 29 Japanese aircraft brought down by American guns. Taylor and Welch heard gunfire early in the morning and



phoned and told the base to arm and fuel their P-40s. Welch was recommended for the Medal of Honor for his heroism, but it was denied him because his commanding officer said he had taken off without orders.



## 6. The Japanese really wanted to take out our aircraft carriers.

But they weren't in port at the time. The Lexington, Enterprise and Saratoga were all out to sea on December 7th. The Imperial Japanese Navy actually knew this at the



time, but reasoned their plan to destroy the maximum number of battleships would constitute a decisive enough victory.

## 7. Americans captured a POW.

After the second wave's guns had gone dry and the attack was finally over, 64 Japanese attackers were dead. But did you know that the Americans captured the very first Japanese POW of World War II on that day? Kazuo Sakamaki, a submariner, was chosen to attack ships in a midget-class sub. During the mission, his sub was disabled and he tried to blow it up with an explosive charge, which failed to go off. When he dove down to investigate why it didn't detonate, he passed out. Unconscious, Sakamaki floated to the surface and washed up on



shore where he was discovered and captured. He spent the whole war in a POW camp. After the war, he worked for Toyota and died in 1999.

## 8. The Day of Infamy speech was only seven minutes long.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt's wording was carefully chosen to emphasize



the atrocity of the attack and the victimhood of

the United States, placing the country as the subject of the opening sentence—The passive phrase, "the United States was ... attacked" as opposed to the more active, "Japan attacked the United States." Roosevelt's speech was designed as a more specific declaration of war, and a departure from the more abstract appeal that President Woodrow Wilson used in his speech to Congress in 1917 when the US entered World War I.

## 9. Canada technically declared war on Japan before the United States did.

Japan's invasion of Hong Kong began the morning of December 8th, 1941. Hawaii's time zone is 18 hours behind, meaning that while British, Indian, and Canadian forces defended against the Japanese forces, war between Canada and Japan was already underway before the first bombs fell on



Pearl Harbor. As a result of the Hong Kong invasion as well

as the surprise assault on Canada's North American ally, Prime Minister Mackenzie King (above) declared that a state of war existed with Japan, which preceded President Roosevelt's address by mere hours.

## 10. Many Japanese tourists pay their respects at the Pearl Harbor memorial.

Now one of America's strongest allies, Japan is the largest source of international tourists to the state of Hawaii. Japanese citizens of all ages—including veterans of the war—go on guided tours to the memorial like the one shown below, to learn about the event which launched the bloody conflict between Japan and the United States, and to the pay respects to the fallen.
